

Flanigan may agree to testify

WASHINGTON (AP) — White House aide Peter M. Flanigan agreed conditionally today to appear before the Senate Judiciary Committee.

He would appear, Flanigan said, if his testimony is limited to his involvement in hiring an independent financial consultant for the Justice Department in its deliberations of an anti-trust case against the International Telephone & Telegraph Corp.

In a letter to Chairman James O. Eastland, D-Miss., Flanigan said "if the committee feels that my testimony ... would be of assistance in its consideration of Mr. Kleindienst's confirmation and the scope of my appearance is limited accordingly, I would welcome the opportunity to appear and testify before your committee."

Flanigan had refused previous committee requests for him to appear before the committee which is considering the nomination of Richard G. Kleindienst to be attorney general.

His refusal and the report that the White House would invoke executive privilege if he should be subpoenaed have caused Democrats, especially Sens. Sam Ervin of North Carolina and Robert Byrd of West Virginia, to say they would attempt to block Kleindienst's nomination first in the com-

mittee and then on the Senate floor.

Flanigan said he would expect the committee, if it accepts his offer, to limit the questioning to his involvement with Richard McLaren, now a U.S. District Court judge in Chicago and his meeting with Harold Geneen, president of ITT.

State woman's body believed found

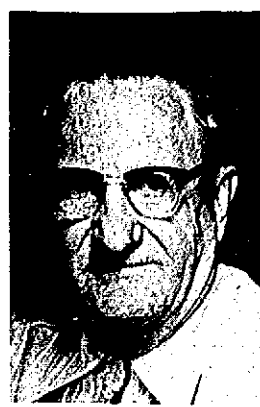
ST. PAUL, Minn. (AP) — Ramsey County authorities say a body found near Cheyenne, Wyo., has been identified tentatively as that of Eunice F. Kratochvil, 33, White Bear Lake.

Mrs. Kratochvil disappeared from her home Feb. 6, 1970. Her car was found a few days later in Shoreview.

Ramsey County sheriff's deputies said Monday the sheriff's office in Cheyenne had sent them articles of clothing and charts of a body found about 18 miles east of Cheyenne two days after Mrs. Kratochvil disappeared.

Wyoming authorities have been trying to identify the badly-battered body since it was found in a ditch about 25 feet off Interstate 80.

Ramsey County authorities said they expected to receive a set of fingerprints from Wyoming, for positive identification.

The death of a rural Lakeville man in a collision Monday night raised Minnesota's 1972 road toll to 145, compared with 205 a year ago.

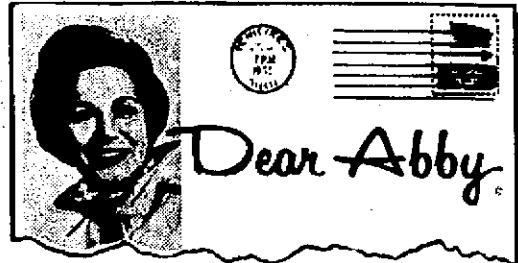
